As a result, no further actions will be taken by the board of directors until our next AGM. We'll be back on track to continue our talks with the municipal council to solve this delicate issue.







Queen for a Day!

You know you've moved to a great community when the municipality comes to your aid... On a very rainy Tuesday last February, Martin and Brian did just that!

I walked down my laneway wearing my "icers" to my car parked by the road. I had to get to work for a loaded day, regardless of what Mother Nature was offering up that morning... The road had been sanded, but a thin coat of ice now covered it, making it very slippery. Since I had to get to work, I ventured a very short distance on it, but decided it wasn't such a great idea after sliding down a section without any control. At this point, I thought it was wise to call the municipality.

By now, the crew had already been out for 3 hours working on the roads, but the rain was giving them a lot of grief. I got in touch with Martin from the municipality who would contact the snowplow driver and get back to me. After a short wait, the grader came along and to my surprise, stopped in front of my laneway. The driver – Brian - stepped out (and nearly landed on his back end it was soooo slippery!) and made his way over to talk to me. He delivered the message that the plow was still about half an hour out. He recommended I wait (even though he had passed with the grader, the surface was still slick). I was willing to wait – no point in chancing it.



I shared that we have been living here full-time since 2016. Without hesitation, he offered to ensure that the road was graded earlier for us now since we had to be on the road early each morning for work. For obvious reasons, our roads were left till after the main school bus routes and ski hill roads were tended to... Wow, I thought, how very kind.

While I waited, I spoke with my husband, Luc, for a few moments. My loving husband offered to bring me breakfast down from the house – on snow shoes!

Shortly after, Brian graded by again (quite quickly!) toward town this time. Soon after, a municipal truck drives up and stops in front of my laneway. Our Buoy Committee



The buoy committee has been working hard toward keeping boaters safe from rock piles on the water.

As a reminder, the buoys are placed in Newton Bay, in its channel, at McElvaney's Rock (Gull Rock), Manley's Rock, on the north side of Mystery Island and finally two buoys are located at the Bowman end of the lake.

One large buoy disappeared for a while, but magically re-appeared a few weeks later. That mystery was never solved.

Last fall, we left bleach bottles attached to the buoy sites to see if they will mark the rock piles until we can install the orange buoys.

Don't forget our committee has a budget from the Association. We're asking you to alert us to other dangerous rock piles you feel need to be marked. Feel free to contact us with your suggestions or post on our Facebook site.

The buoys are a small way our Association makes a big contribution to lake safety. Please keep an eye out for the buoys and inform one of the committee members if you see any damaged or loose ones.

Thanks once again to the committee members: Jean Duchesne who looks after the Mystery Island buoy, Gilles Proulx for the Bowman buoys and Darrell Robinson & George Mellean who helped with the other buoys.



To start, the Prud'homme family cottage –a self-sufficient log wood building located in the channel leading to the last bay in Newton Bay - was built in 1963. His father, Jacques, was only 12 then. Jo himself has been on the lake his entire life – since 1979! 39 years! His partner, Mylène, was introduced to the lake 6 years ago.

The lake is his second home and represents family, peace and a place to reenergize.

When he was younger, he loved waterskiing and much more. His father always encouraged him and his sister to enjoy water sports... Now that he's older, he prefers being on the water. He loves seadoing, going to the Sand Bar with friends and neighbours, ATVing, enjoying our wonderful paradise and sharing with great people around him.


One of his oldest memories is of the family cottage being a place to gather and party. He remembers wine and cheese association gatherings with well over 100 people from the lake. Though he was young, he was in charge for parking the boats. When he and his sister were a little older, it was their turn to host gatherings with their family and friends on weekends. They wanted to show their father how the new generation partied and knew he would be on board.

One of the annual GPB (Grand Poisson Blanc) parties had 255 guests, a DJ, three live bands, games, water sports, and an open bar. It has been sponsored by Molson, Coors-Light and others. The music could be heard over 2 km away on the lake... Some will remember having lined up their boats in front of the cottage to watch the show.

Historical Capsule

It's 1943! It's Spring Break! The log cutting has concluded for the year. The logs are piled on the ice and we wait for the ice to thaw, the level of the lake to rise, and finally to



float the logs to the respective sawmills. This spring break takes longer than a week. In the meantime, some of the loggers participate in the making of Maple Syrup. Others take the time to visit family.

Wildlife Capsule: the Coywolf

The what? The coywolf... We share our paradise with it... You may have read about it, maybe seen it or its tracks... or even heard it. More often, its calls and howls ring out at night or early morning.

But what is it? Wolf... Coyote... Actually, it's a hybrid. It results from a cross between eastern wolves and western coyotes... and dogs. According to genetic research, this animal's DNA is made up firstly of a high percentage of coyote, then wolf and finally a small part of dog. According to an article published by a journalist on the matter, this represents respectively 60%, 25% and 15%. 6 out of 10 of Quebec's wolves have coyote blood.



Some advice:

Don't feed wild animals.

Don't feed your cats and dogs outside.

Keep your dogs on a leash.

Well over a century ago, wolves were found in Quebec and Ontario and coyotes out West. These two species lived differently and in different habitats. Their cross is surprising since wolves

tend to attack and kill coyotes. So how is this hybrid explained?

According to scientists, the near wipe-out of wolves following a number of factors including climactic changes, human's desire to rid itself of it and a lack of sexual partners led to their first mating in 1920 with coyotes having travelled from the West to Ontario's Algonquin Park.

Are they dangerous? What do we do if we meet one? Though they're curious and may observe us a few moments, they're generally wary of humans and will avoid us. However, if you're outside, be alert, make noise and bring a whistle.

According to the NCC, these animals are an important part of our ecosystem.

- Disappearance of several fresh water mollusk and aquatic invertebrate populations





Eurasian Milfoil

- Deteriorates water quality and habitat
- Spreads through fragmentation (boat propellers, trailers, fishing gear)
- Accelerates lake ageing
- Inhibits swimming, boating and sportfishing
